2025 SNRS Research Grant

Applications are now being accepted for the **SNRS Research Grant** (due October 1st).

The purpose of the SNRS Research Grant Award is to support and promote new investigators in initiating or building a program of research, which advances nursing science and practice. Funds are available for quantitative and qualitative research on any topic relevant to the nursing profession. This award will fund research that is not being done for course credit. The SNRS Research Grant is for up to \$7500.

Applications MUST BE DATED NO LATER THAN October 1st of each year.

Member Spotlight: We proudly highlight **Dr. Kavita Radhakrishnan**, PhD, MSEE, RN, FAAN, from the University of Texas at Austin School of Nursing. Recently appointed Associate Dean for Research, Dr. Radhakrishnan is pioneering research that integrates cutting-edge technologies, such as telemonitoring, connected sensors, and digital gaming, to address clinical nursing challenges, including heart failure self-management. Her long-term goal is to develop affordable, scalable health interventions that support 'aging in place.' Notably, Dr. Radhakrishnan has secured a multi-million-dollar grant from the National Institutes of Health to conduct a clinical trial on sensor-controlled digital games aimed at improving heart failure self-management behaviors.



Dr. Jyotsana Parajuli is an assistant professor in the School of Nursing and an affiliate faculty in the

Gerontology Program at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte. Her research focuses on palliative and end of life care in older adults with cancer and their family caregivers. She recently received two grant funding to support her research: a) R15 grant from the National Institute of Aging (NIA) – this study will focus on development and validation of a palliative care readiness tool for older adults with cancer and b) Sigma/Hospice and Palliative Nurses Foundation End of Life Nursing Care Research Grant which will focus on creating the tool for family caregivers of older adults with cancer. The palliative care readiness tool would allow clinicians to assess patients' and families' readiness for palliative care and provide targeted palliative care that is congruent with their readiness. Eventually, this would improve early utilization of palliative care in this population. Her research has a great potential to shift paradigm in the field of geriatric oncology and palliative care and make a difference in the lives of older adults with cancer and their family caregivers.

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
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
